Grade 1

Memory Work: 1 Chronicles 16:11 "Seek the Lord and his strength; seek his presence continually!"

Phonics: This week we're looking at words that have the spelling pattern -ay or -ai.

Spelling: day, may, way, say, pay, play, main, wait, train, brain

Field Day: This Wednesday, students in grades 1-8 will be participating in our school's field day! This will take place on our playground here at school. Most students in our class will be in the 6-year-old group as they are sorted by calendar year. Our class has a group leader for boys and girls who will guide them through the various events for the day.

Please remember to prepare your child for a full day outdoors; water, sunscreen, layered clothing, hats, and running shoes are recommended. We will be coming inside for a lunch break. Please send a full lunch for our active grade ones!

Students who place first, second, or third in an event will receive a ribbon. All children in grade 1 will get one participation ribbon at the beginning of the day. In class we're discussing our different God-given gifts, how those gifts are used and recognized, and managing disappointment and success on field day. Students will benefit from continuing those conversations at home.

Bible: Students in grade one have started a new routine. Our Bible classes now begin with a rousing rendition of "The B-I-B-L-E" as we settle onto the rug for the story. Exploring God's word together is a favourite activity for grade one students! We will complete our unit on David this week.

Creation Studies: Students are taking careful observations of their bean seeds. We have added soil to our plants and hope to see their green leaves soon!

Grade 2A

Memory Work: Our memory work is from, Romans 8:31, 32 "If God is for us, who is against us? He did not even spare His own Son but gave Him up for us all. How will He not also, with Him grant us everything?" I will listen to memory work on Friday, May 16.

Phonics: We will look at r-controlled vowel words with the patterns -ur, -ure and -ur_e.

Spelling: Our spelling words are: **turn, burned, surf, sure, cure, pure, picture, nurse, land** and **they.** Our spelling test will be on Friday, May 16.

Math: We will look at the meaning of congruent (shapes that are the same in size and shape) and symmetry (found by folding a shape in half) We will also look at patterns made up of shapes and learn how to find the pattern core and recognize what comes next in a pattern.

Writing: We will continue to work on our animal reports. We are researching our animals' habitat, appearance and food, as well as how they look after their babies.

Science: We will finish looking at birds and then look closely at the characteristics of reptiles. How did God create reptiles to survive some pretty harsh climates?

Social Studies (Miss Sluys): Students seem pretty pumped to work on their projects. Hope everything is going well so far. One addition to the list of content for students to choose from is Interesting Facts. Projects are due: May 29, 2025.
