Memory Work: 1 Corinthians 5:17 *"Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come."*

Socials: This month is all about Butterflies! We are expecting some little visitors to be delivered this week, and we will watch them in our classroom, following along on their metamorphosis journey. There will also be some secret work for a special day!

Math: We will look briefly at how we measure time, and learn how a clock is arranged. You can reinforce this learning by looking at your analog clocks at home with them too!

Show & Tell: Boys on Wednesday (can you find two things that rhyme?)

Next Monday May 12, we will have a field trip to Lorne C Henderson, with some guided learning by the staff there, along with SK-A. We will need a few chaperones, so please let me know if you can join us. We will not be able to accommodate younger siblings on this outing.

Classroom News

Grade 1

Mrs. Tetreault

Phonics: This week we'll work on 2-syllable words with at least one long vowel sound.

Spelling: mistake, invite, inside, entire, would, could, when, these, said, here

Memory Work: We will add to our psalm of David: Psalm 24: 1-4: *"The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it; for he founded it on the seas and established it on the waters. Who may ascend the mountain of the LORD? Who may stand in his holy place? The one who has clean hands and a pure heart, who does not trust in an idol or swear by a false god."*

Math: We have been working on a short mental math, and will wrap it up with a test on Thursday. Our next unit is on Addition and Subtraction to 50!

Creation Studies: We have dissected and learned about the parts of seeds. Each child planted a bean seed in a plastic bag so we can observe the process of sprouting each day! Ask your child what's happening with their seed! We continue our study of plants with a look at their parts and what they need to live.

Bible: David was chosen by God and anointed by Samuel to be the future king of Israel! We've read the story of David and Goliath and learned how God helped David win many battles. Next, we'll explore how King Saul responds to David's victories, discover what happens while David is in exile, and see how he finally becomes king after Saul's death.

Lunches: Please check in with your child to see if they may benefit from a few extra snacks in their lunchbox. Please send in a spoon or fork if your child's lunch requires one. Thanks!

Field Trip: On May 22, our class will be going on a field trip to Greenview Aviaries in Morpeth! The four parent volunteer spots covered by the school have already been filled—thank you to those who volunteered! If any other adults would like to join us, you're very welcome! Additional adult tickets are available for \$12 each. (Please note: adults only.) This trip ties into our new Creation Studies unit, "The Needs of Living Things," and will be a wonderful way to celebrate our learning about God's amazing creatures!

Phys. Ed: We are preparing for track and field season by learning proper throwing form, trying running long, high and standing long jumps, and building endurance for sprints and distance races. We are also learning about trying our best, encouraging one another, and managing our disappointment when someone else wins! Students in grade one will participate in the track and field day at JKCS on Wednesday, May 14 (*note that this is a change from the original school calendar date). Parent volunteers are needed to supervise and encourage our young athletes for the day as they go to each event. Grade 2A

Memory Work: Our memory work is from, Romans 8:31, 32 ***"If God is for us, who is against us? He did not even spare His own Son but gave Him up for us all. How will He not also, with Him grant us everything?"***

Phonics: This week we will look at r-controlled vowel words with the patterns -or, -ore, and -oar.

Spelling: Our spelling words are: **born, short, storm, north, organize, chores, store, roar, board** and **door**. Our spelling test will be on Friday, May 9.

Math: This week we will look more at shapes. We will learn the difference between an open and closed 2-D shape. We will also identify and classify polygons by the number of sides, angles and vertices.

Writing: We will continue to work on our animal reports this week. We are researching our animals' habitat, appearance and food, as well as how they look after their babies.

Science: We will move onto our next animal group, Birds, and look at the characteristics that all birds share. Can all birds fly? Do they all have feathers? Can you believe it is May and there are only 7 more weeks of school! We look forward to Track and Field Day and many class trips in these last weeks of school! This week we will finish off our last MAP Assessment on reading.

Spelling: We have a short week so we have a few less words this week - the other words will be bonus words. Our spelling words are full of suffixes which we have talked about many times over the last few months. Test on Friday!

Reading: We have just started digging into *Sarah, Plain and Tall*. We will read a couple of chapters this week as we discuss what life was like on a pioneer farm in the prairies.

Math: We will finish our unit on time this week and jump into our geometry unit. We will be looking at 3-D shapes and their faces, bases, edges and vertices as we describe and compare them.

French: Ask your child to tell you the colour of things around your house in French this week. Our other vocabulary we are learning are a car (une auto), a bicycle (une bicyclette), a plane (un avion), and a train (un train).

Music: We will review our music note values and names for the next couple of weeks!

Memory Work: Galatians 6:9-10 ***"And let us not grow weary of doing good, for in due season we will reap, if we do not give up. So then, as we have opportunity, let us do good to everyone, and especially to those who are of the household of faith."*** We will work on this verse over the next two weeks.

Science: Last week we briefly began our soil unit. This week we will dive into the different types of soils: clay, loam, silt and sand. The students will be examining different samples and we will learn about the different types of particles and how water passes through.

Grammar: From this point forward, we will review and work on mastering our grammar skill in different formats through written work, games and activities.

Writing: Back by popular demand, the students would like to do another "mystery object." They did very well last week and enjoyed creating riddles to stump their classmates. We will do all the writing in class, however, if your child could choose an object by Wednesday and bring in their object on Friday, that would be appreciated.

Phys Ed: Our class is going outside every Monday and Wednesday afternoon. Please ensure your child is wearing weather appropriate clothing and footwear. The grade 3's will be doing their 800m race on Thursday afternoon.

Grade 4

We have an exciting short week ahead of us!

Field Trip: For our day at the Lambton Centre on Thursday, students should be prepared for a full day outdoors. Last night I sent out a parent email with the schedule of events for the day and what students are asked to bring along. Please reach out if you did not receive it!

Memory Work: Psalm 135: 1-9. There will be a fill-in-the blank test this Friday on the first two verses.

Bible: As a concluding assessment on the Psalms and Proverbs unit, students will work on a word pictures assignment.

Spelling: There will not be a spelling lesson or test this week.

P.E.: We continue with our track and field practices this week! Grade 4 students run the 800 metre race tomorrow! Our P.E. classes are every Wednesday and Friday.

Health: Last week we had a quiz to assess understanding of the skeletal system. This week we will conclude the unit by focusing on nutrition and healthy relationships (including on-line safety, bullying, and peer pressure). There will be a short quiz on Wednesday on this portion of this unit.

Science: Our last unit of study is all about pulleys and gears! This is a fun hands-on unit which will include a science project to be completed at home. Students will be asked to build a device using pulleys and gears. We have been brainstorming ideas in class and the students are excited! The students took home a package today explaining in detail the requirements. This project is due on Friday June 6.

Math: In geometry we will create a geometric house and school. This assignment will focus on geometric terms (acute, obtuse, and right triangles). Today students completed their MAP math test.

Novel Study: We will conclude our novel study this week. Students have been busy working on various activities, chapter quizzes, and class discussions.

French (Madame DeBoer): We are creating props and the backdrop this week for our play performances; continue to memorize your parts!

Math: We are continuing angles in math. We have been learning to use a protractor to measure and draw angles.

MAP Testing is happening this week.

Bible: We are continuing our unit on Jesus' ministry - The Sermon on the Mount. We will learn what Jesus taught about prayer and how the crowd reacted to the Sermon on the Mount. That will conclude this Bible unit, and we will have a Bible test on Thursday.

Literature: Continuing our literacy circles with "Island of the Blue Dolphins".

Music: We are going back to recorders and music theory.

Grammar: We are emphasizing adverbs and adjectives as well as complete sentences as students begin a new writing unit.

Writing: We will begin our unit of writing on creative fictional narratives.

Physical Education: Track and field practice. Grade 5s will participate in ball throw, standing and running long jump, high jump, 100m, 200m, and 800m events.

Field Trip: This Thursday, May 8th, we will be heading to Lambton Centre for a field trip to participate in a variety of activities, including low elements, archery/slingshots, team challenges, and instincts for survival. We would love to have more parent volunteers join us! If you are available, please email me! Thank you! We will be leaving the school at about 9 am and returning around 3 pm.

Grade 6 Spelling (Mrs. Van DenAssem): This is our last week of doing alternate spelling. The students are learning the seven different syllable types, which is helpful for both reading and spelling. There is no test this week. They will be marked on the sentences they provide, using both their sight words and words from this week's lesson. They will complete this in class. It has been a pleasure to do this mini unit!

Math: Transformations and Cartesian Planes test will be on Wednesday this week. Then we will begin a new unit on Algebraic Expressions.

Bible: We will be diving deep into Paul's second missionary journey.

Social Studies: We will continue on our geography lessons and learn about seasons and climates and how they effect trade.

Literature: We will continue our focus on the use of powerful, strong words and how they are important when used in advertising.

Science: The nervous system will be studied fully this week.

Music: We have been having some fun getting reacquainted with boomwhackers the past couple of weeks. This week, we will be focusing on composing music with boomwhackers.

Art: We will continue our special art this Friday.

French (Madame DeBoer): We are working on our specific parts for the scenes of the play that we'll be filmed; please work on memorizing your part.

Memory Work-- Proverbs 4: 7

Bible: We are continuing to study the book of Proverbs and diving for pearls of wisdom looking at various topics through the book such as discernment, understanding, fear of the Lord, folly, and knowledge.

Math: We have begun our next unit in math which is financial literacy. This week we are learning to work within a budget in various scenarios and creating financial plans to meet small scale and larger scale budgets.

Literature: Students are at different stages in their study of *The Hobbit*. Some are continuing to read through the latter chapters and work on comprehension questions, and others who have completed the book are working on overview essays.

Grammar: Prepositional phrases.

Phys. Ed: Last week preparing for field day, working on high jump, long jump, triple jump, shot putt, and the running races.

Science: Looking at the effects of heat on solids, liquids, and gases.

Geography: Examining different perspectives on natural resources, specifically land ownership, mining the land in Nunavut, and fishing in the Yukon.

Art: Finishing a weaving craft.

Music: Learning to play ukulele by ear and practicing playing chord patterns.
